FARMER'S MARKET AT FOREST PARK

The Farmers' Market at Forest Park is two thirds done for this 21st season. Even with all of the rain we've had this summer, the produce is gorgeous. It is such a pleasure to make a meal with just items from the market.

In addition to produce, we have beef, pork, chicken, dairy products, baked goods, both sweet and savory, honey, maple products, wine and hard cider, prepared food to either eat at the market, or take home, beverages, and more. You almost don't have to go to the grocery store at this time of year.

We are fortunate to have lots of farms in Western Massachusetts, and the people who are willing to do the hard work of farming. I encourage everyone to patronize either a farmers' market, or farm stand. Go out of your way if necessary to give them your support.

Last year a new program started in Massachusetts called the Healthy Incentive Program aka HIP. This is for folks who receive SNAP (food stamp) benefits. Depending on the size of one's family, they get either \$40, \$60, or \$80 per month in fresh fruits and vegetables. The customer goes to a participating farmer, chooses what they want, brings it to the cashier, and the money for the purchase comes out of the shopper's SNAP account. Then, when the transaction is over, the money used goes right back into the shopper's SNAP account. It doesn't matter how much the person gets in benefits. Some people only get \$15 in SNAP

benefits, but they still get the full HIP benefit.

HIP is a win-win program. The SNAP beneficiaries and the farmers benefit.

Our market runs through the end of October. Our Saturday winter market begins the second Saturday of November.

Presentation start times will be at 4 P.M. and at 5 P.M.


