FARMER'S MARKET AT FOREST PARK

Spring is here and that means the return of the outdoor Farmer's Market at Forest Park. The market is open weekly on Tuesdays, May through October, rain or shine, from 12:30 to 6 p.m. and is the largest in this part of the Pioneer Valley. Visitors to the Farmer's Market will find a wide range of offerings, from about 30 vendors with a product range which includes dairy, meat, baked goods, produce, kettle corn, honey, maple products, cheese, fresh juice, prepared food, wine, hard cider, soap and lotion, relishes, salsas, ham and jelly, plants, micro-greens, and more! Market visitors can access the market through both the Sumner Avenue and Trafton Road entrances to Forest Park. The vehicle fee is waived for Market-goers.

C3 CORNER: UPDATE FROM THE C3 FOREST PARK TEAM

Good news for Forest Park—the "C-3 Forest Park Safe Community Engagement Initiative" has recently expanded! Under the supervision of Sergeant Ariel Toledo, there are now seven Springfield Police Dept. officers assigned to the unit, plus one state trooper. In addition, there is representation from the Sheriff's Dept. of Hampden County, plus the ongoing contributions of the Police Community Liaison and the C3 Civilian Coordinator. A number of community partners also participate regularly, including representatives of the Hampden District Attorney's office, Springfield City Library, Springfield Public Schools, Boy Scouts, Gandara Stop Access Coalition, Roca Inc., MA Parents United, and Dunn and Phillips, P.C., along with many others. Forest Park C-3 is funded through the Springfield Police Dept. and focuses on improving our Forest Park neighborhood safety and community.

Weekly Meetings - Weekly daytime meetings are now held every Monday at 10AM at Calvary's Love Church (17-19 Oakland Street, across from the Forest Park Middle School near Sumner Avenue—use the church parking lot and enter through the left ground-floor entrance). The evening meetings continue to be held every Thursday at 6PM at Holy Name Social Center (53 Alderman Street). Essential Goals - The essential goals of C-3 (which stands for "Counter Criminal Continuum Policing") are to:

- Create a safe and secure environment
- Promote and foster community relationships/partnerships
- Reduce gang activity and violence
- Reduce drug activity, and
- Establish positive and effective youth/parental programs

The Unit has been working especially hard to decrease our neighborhood crime rate, to encourage our many law-abiding citizens to work closely with the officers in their law enforcement efforts, and to support youth mentoring and family educational efforts that will benefit our community.

Recent Community Activities

Over the last several months, C-3 have sponsored numerous neighborhood activities. These community activities have been designed to promote understanding and camaraderie between our local youth and their families and the C-3 officers.

Plans for an Expanded C-3 Summer Basketball League: In order to continue the notable success of the recent C-3 Basketball Leagues, an expanded Forest Park C-

3 Summer League will be held from early May (tentatively starting May 9) into July. This year, students from the neighborhood elementary schools will be part of the league (including Brookings, Kensington, Sumner Ave., Washington St., and White St. Schools), as well as the Forest Park Middle School students.

All interested neighborhood residents, parents, representatives of businesses and community groups are invited to attend the games at the Forest Park Middle School Gymnasium (tentatively on Tuesdays and Wednesdays).

Volunteers from the community or local businesses are always needed to support and publicize the League.
